Joyce has spent most of her life helping her people.

Parking Problems

Few neighbourhood issues generate as much heat as parking. Parking. already tight, must become tighter still, when development now under construction or awaiting approval is completed. Kerbside space, must be used efficiently.

One area where this is clearly not happening is at the Abercrombie Street shops. There, a nine metre space is reserved all day for Australia Post. Three daily pick ups averaging an estimated 40 seconds each means that this 24 hour reservation gets two minutes use each day.

George Sarkis, among others, is a victim of this absurd situation, having no rear access to his shop. It is both impractical for him and dangerous for pedestrians, for George to cart bulky and heavy produce along the footpath from a limited parking zone.

Hence he is forced to park illegally, and inevitably gets booked.

It is mind-boggling how efficient the forces of law and order are in handing out parking infringement notices in an area where you can sell or use hard drugs, or wander the streets with offensive weapons with little fear of arrest.

But, dear reader - that's another story.

George pays taxes, he pays rates — Australia Post doesn't! George runs a small business — Australia Post is a gigantic monopoly. So George decides not to pay the fine, goes to court, explains his case and the matter is thrown out of court — no fine, no costs, no nothing, which goes to show... TONY LONG

Green direction for the Block

In Redfern, the Block is often more widely portraved and seen as Sydney's slum of rats and heroin, smashed walls, rickety roofs and crumbling balconies, where crime becomes the idiom for official thinking. (Reflections on Redfern, Kay Anderson).

It is also home to many typical present day Australian Aboriginal families. In Eveleigh St, a revival of the community garden is presently being undertaken. It proceeds with the characteristic local contest of endurance between scepticism and the struggle to maintain the initial vision. In communal fashion, (DSS) Skillshare on the Block provides most of the current workforce. Its trainee landscapers are redesigning the community's 6 year old garden. Garden objectives remain those sought in 1991 by local mothers who founded it. Being offered an alternative social activity, residents have an opportunity to spend leisure time productively.

Earlier garden harvests consisted mainly of conventional fruits and vegetables. Recent surveying has indicated a desire for a native garden with bush tucker and traditional native herbs.

It is strongly hoped that the project builds some sense of pride and influences the cultivation of Aboriginal cultural values, especially amongst the youth.

In whatever form the Block redevelopment takes, it is hoped that the garden will be here.

It is being designed for the experience and enjoyment of current residents. While the Block will remain an important meeting centre in Sydney for Aboriginals, a native garden most appropriately reinforces this.

Pulpit

Wake Up!! Smell the con-job and start getting active. While you were arguing the toss on a republic, while you were wasting your breath supporting a free-heroin trial, the real game was happening elsewhere.

The biggest game on the planet these days is economic rationalism and if you're not discussing it, then you're helping it.

Economic rationalism is a pseudointellectual way for greedy people to justify the rubric "heads I win, tails you lose." It preaches that the markets are Kings; that Governments have "no business being in business".

Corporations and the management who work for them are the winners in this arrangement. The net benefit to the rest of us is almost impossible to define because the results of selling off electricity generation or Telstra are always claimed as projections, to be revisited later. It's all done with mirrors; sell to the Germans something which already belongs to tax payers and then tell the public it's all for the best. To justify it the ER mavens tell us electricity is no longer a 'public utility', it's now a 'business'.

But ER is a lie. The most economically 'dry' politician in this country, Jeff Kennett, lives by the premise that his Government has no business being in business. Except when his buddy, Lloyd Williams, wants to build a casino. Then Jeff's Government has every intention of being in business; so much so that they pass special legislation giving Lloydie a monopoly. Same with Jeff's worker's injury insurer, Workcover, whose executives gave themselves a 74 percent pay rise recently while lobbying for extinguishment of the common law right of workers to sue their boss for negligence.

But how can any politician extinguish the common law right of a worker to sue his boss? Well, while you were sleeping there was a dirty little business called 'Wik' and it was all about common law and who is allowed to use it. Old jungle saying says this: "when Fascists wants to take common law away from the people, they start with the blacks...then they come for the working people". JOHN FAIRFAX

Disability Services Aboriginal Corporation

Say no to drugs for the next generation

The Settlement Neighbourhood Centre his recently begun an exciting new venture with the support of NSW Users and AIDS Assoc. Inc (NUAA). The project targets young Koori people living on 'The Block' in Redfern who may be at risk of contracting drug related diseases such as Hepatitis C.

The project aims to provide a space where the 'Tribe' (a small working party from the target group) can come and discuss issues relevant to their health and/or injecting drug use. The group meets regularly every Monday and Wednesday at The Settlement.

Coordinator Naomi Smith describes their project. "We are a group of young people who are experiencing life as users. We are trying to educate ourselves and our younger generation about the risks associated with using drugs (like heroin, cocaine and marijuana) and other drugs that may hit the streets of The Block. We are hoping to do this by making a mural in the community to show the effects of drugs use. We would like the whole community to see our work, therefore we would like the mural to be somewhere where everyone can learn from it".

Currently 'the tribe' are looking for a space for their mural. They would like to invite any one interested in being involved to contact their coordinator Naomi on 9698 3087.
